According to the criteria for explanation of Intangible Heritage, the "Lace of Pag" is the masterpiece of extraordinary example illustrating the important degree of human creativity with connection with live tradition, with beliefs and faith, with works of art and literary works of global value.



LACE, LANDSCAPE AND TIME








LACE, LANDSCAPE AND TIME







LACE DESIGN

In the mind of an artist, the natural structures of salt crystals, sea, sky and wind (bura) and Pag stone walls, reaching a crystal pure structure.








DETAILS OF LACE MOTIVES


The particular elements of the Pag lace are:

- 1. gusta pogacica (tick roundshape roll with little teeth)
- 2. zupcić (little tooth)
- 3. mendulica (triangle shape)
- 4. kolumbarici (thick circle shape)
- 5. listacice (thick little leaf)

The lace of Pag is like microcosmos model. Every small part is essential for the whole structure.


Each part is particular and has its own specific **beauty** line. Pag lace is an **art inspirative** structure.


LACE FROM PAST TO FUTURE
